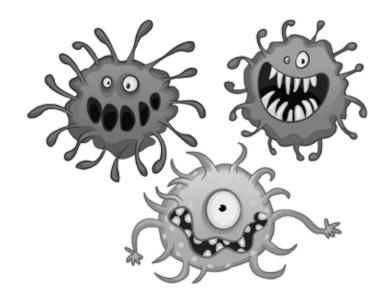
Easy to Use and Standards-Based




